On the social situation and EU social "acquis"

1. What do you see as most pressing employment and social priorities?

Mefop mainly act in the field of supplementary pensions. Therefore, from our perspective, an adequate income for old age is a priority. We believe that supplementary pensions should play an important role to achieve this objective. In many countries, pension provision from the first state pillar is being scaled back to address demographic pressures; to ensure adequate living standards in old age the role of supplementary pension is key.

Pensions are not the only concern linked to the ageing of population. Also healthcare system and, more in general, the welfare provision as a whole are under threat. As in the domain of pensions, to cope with the ageing and the effects of technological improvements on public expenditure for welfare state, an important role will be presumably played by supplementary provision of healthcare and welfare serves and treatments.

2. How can we account for different employment and social situations across Europe?

Since social policy falls under the remit of the Member States sharing best practices while taking into account different employment and social situations across Europe may be very important. In this respect, peer reviews on pension reforms and welfare systems could be a way to better learn from each other.

Moreover, minimum standards instead of harmonization are more appropriate ways to regulate these issues.

Economic and financial crisis from 2008 so far, together with IT brakethrough and ageing, raise concerns on the EU social "acquis" to deal with new social fragilities. This approach seems to be the best way to identify possible areas for action in the context of a process of social innovation.

Technological changes offer great opportunities to progress in efficiency, better information and services related to welfare systems. However they also seems to have e huge and not always positive impact on market labour, at least in the short term.

New ways of work: more and more people are working as self-employed or short term working contracts. This new forms of employment are posing serious challenges to individuals and welfare systems, both in terms of adequacy and sustainability.

Mefop shares the common values and principles outlined in the Pillar such as universality of healthcare, access to high quality care, cost-effectiveness and sustainability, health promotion and prevention. However the support for these common principles is based on the consideration that the organization of healthcare remains subject to the subsidiarity principle and is therefore within the competences of the EU Member States.

EU Commission should promote initiatives to increase coverage of supplementary healthcare schemes to deal with the effects of ageing and technologic evolution on healthcare sustainability and adequacy. A supportive, stable, simple and modern tax treatment is key to encourage people to continue saving up more. Mefop also strongly believes that information to members and beneficiaries and the governance of the schemes are effective means to achieve healthcare adequacy and encourage people to be involved. We call on the EU to take a comprehensive approach to healthcare and to create an enabling environment for healthcare provision in the current challenging economic and demographic conditions.

We call on the EU to take a comprehensive approach to pensions and to create an enabling environment for supplementary pensions in the current challenging economic and demographic conditions.

However, for any EU actions, Mefop recommends caution by reminding that a one size fits all approach does not exists, considering the diversity between existing pensions systems across member states.
